Language Arts Course Description: In eighth grade ELA, students focus on the development of skills in vocabulary, grammar, and multiple genres of writing because these are the basic building blocks that allow access to complex text and clear, concise expression of ideas and insights. The ability to read, speak, and write in Standard English will open doors throughout the remainder of the educational process as well as in a chosen career path. The structure of this course is broken down into 9-week modules (one module every quarter). Within each module is a three-week unit. Students can expect an assessment at the end of each three-week unit. Students will receive a workbook for each module, and will do the majority of their classwork inside of this workbook. Module 1. Finding Home: Refugees Central Text: Inside Out and Back Again, Thanhha Lai Module 2. The Comedy of Control Central Text: A Midsummer Night's Dream, William Shakespeare Module 3. Civil Rights Movement & the Little Rock Nine Central Text: A Mighty Long Way, Carlotta Walls Lanier Module 4. Sustainability of World's Food Supply Central Text: The Omnivore's Dilemma, YR Edition, Michael Pollan

Social Studies Course Description: Students in eighth grade will build on the fourth and fifth grade introductions to North Carolina and the U.S. by embarking on a more rigorous study of the historical foundations and democratic principles that continue to shape our state and nation. The main focus of the course is the critical events, personalities, issues, and developments in the state and nation from the Revolutionary Era to contemporary times. Inherent in this study is an analysis of the relationship of geography, events, and diverse groups of people to the political, economic, technological, and cultural developments that shaped our existence in North Carolina and the United States over time.

**Assessments and Grading:** Eighth grade classes honor the grading plan posted on the school website. Each ELA module and social studies unit will include at least one major assessment. Major assessments may include tests, projects, and/or writing assignments. Students will be given quizzes, short writing assignments, classwork, and homework assignments to enrich understanding of skills taught throughout the unit. Classwork and homework will be graded for completion and accuracy. Homework will be assigned every night, and the five assignments will be checked each day and combined for one weekly homework grade at the end of the week.
